

Global Rotation Criteria and Key Info

(Note: subject to adjustment for 2010-2011 program)

What are the academic requirements to be academically eligible for Campus Rotation?

- Students must maintain a minimum GPA of 2.67 at the end of Module A and thereafter.
- If students are slightly under the minimum, the Hult Academic team will develop a plan to help them reach the minimum GPA.
- Final decisions about students' eligibility for rotation are at the discretion of the "home" campus's Executive Director and Dean.

Can students take part in Global Rotation if they under disciplinary action?

- Students cannot rotate if they are under disciplinary action.
- Possible reasons for such action include behavioral issues, tuition nonpayment, incomplete application or immunization records, among others.

How many students can rotate to each campus?

Rotation is subject to each campus's capacity. A lottery may be used if demand exceeds capacity at any campus.

Can Hult guarantee a student will receive his/her first choice of electives?

- While Hult's staff will make every effort to enroll students in their first choices of electives at the desired rotation or home campus, there is no guarantee that student will get their first choice.
- In the event of an oversubscribed course, a lottery may take place.
- Likewise, undersubscribed courses may be cancelled. In such cases students will be placed in the alternate electives they selected for that same campus.

When will students be able to rotate between campuses?

- *MBA*: Rotation takes place in Module C and/or D.
- *Master of International Business*:: Rotation takes place in Module C and/or D, OR it is possible to do an internship in module C. It is not possible to rotate and do an internship. Internships are not guaranteed.
- *MA in International Relations*: Rotation takes place in Module C only (San Francisco/ Shanghai), thus there is no possibility to do an internship and rotate.

Where can a student graduate?

- Students graduate on their “home” campus or at their Module D rotation campus.
- Students make this decision during course registration in Module B.

What administrative office organizes Campus Rotation?

Student Services Offices, under the supervision of the Executive Directors at each campus.

What additional financial responsibilities do students take on by rotating?

- Students are responsible for obtaining their own visas and the associated costs. Student services will help with this process.
- Visa costs vary depending on the combination of passport and destination country; fees range from \$0 to more than \$800.
- Students are also responsible for their own travel, subsistence, and housing arrangements, but Student Services will help with any logistics.
- A student who has any outstanding fees is not eligible for rotation.

Is there a fee for participating in Campus Rotation?

- No, but there is a refundable deposit that must be paid at registration.
 - If a student qualifies for the rotation, the student must pay a USD 500 deposit per campus to the “home” Student Services Office in local currency.
 - If two rotations are planned, then the student needs to pay USD 1000 in local currency.
 - The deposit is reimbursed via the “home” campus finance representative when the student attends orientation on the “rotation” campus.

What happens if a student’s visa application is rejected?

- Rotation is subject to the process of obtaining a visa. If the visa application is denied, students will be enrolled in their second choice of campus as capacity, course availability, corresponding visa status, and time allow.
- Please note that some nationalities have found it particularly difficult to obtain visas for their rotation campuses:
- Shanghai Campus: Pakistan, Iraq, Iran, Bangladesh, Somalia, Nigeria, Turkmenistan
- U.S. Campuses: Iran, Syria, parts of the Middle East, Inner Asia, and Africa. It has been particularly difficult for African and Latin American students applying for U.S. visas in London.
